Branches of Philosophy:

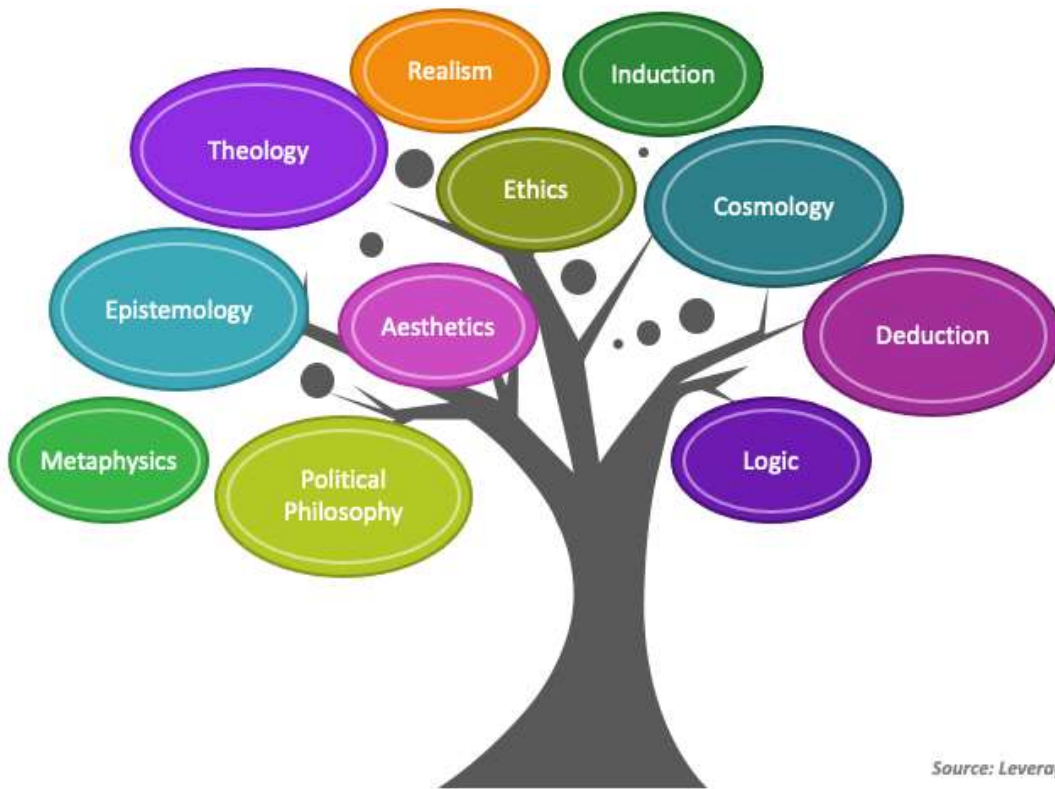
Philosophy has been divided into several branches, each focusing on specific areas of inquiry.

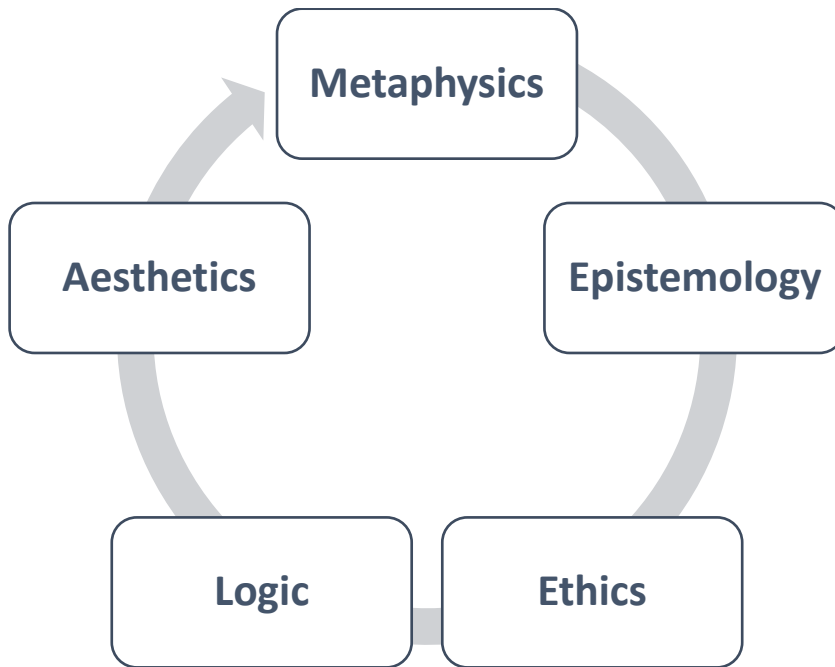

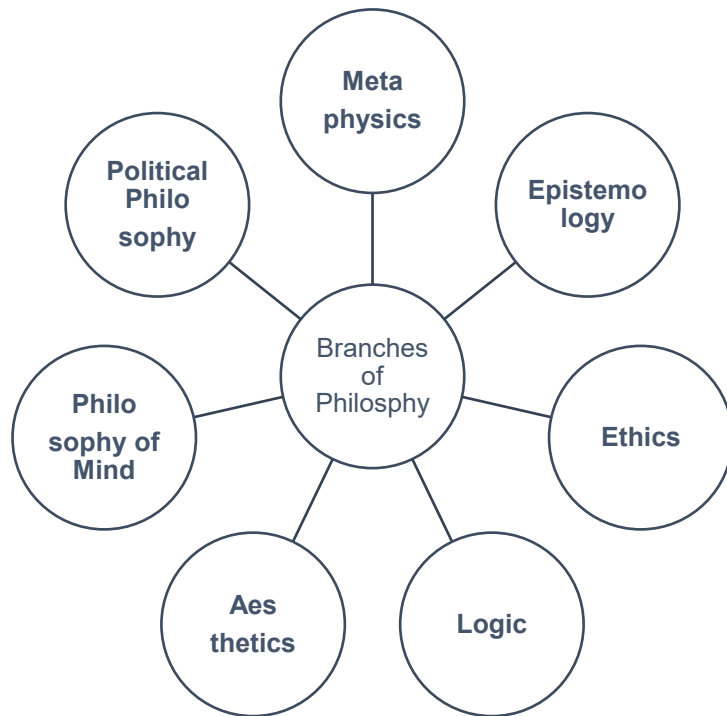
Moreover, concepts can be concrete or abstract. Concrete concepts represent things that we can perceive directly with our senses, such as a tree or a book. In

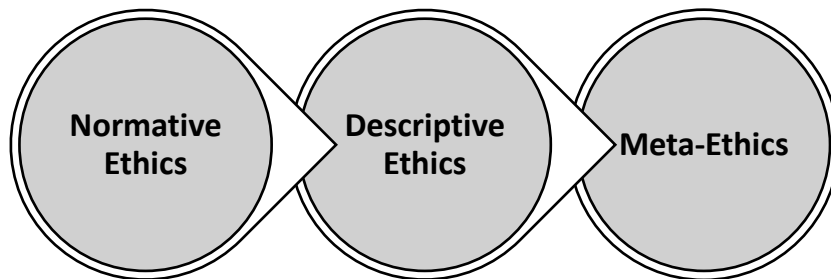

ETHICS – DEFINITIONS

4. **Friedrich Nietzsche:** Nietzsche criticized the concept of universal morality. He proposed that ethics is subjective and that moral values are rooted in cultural, social, and historical contexts.
5. **Alasdair MacIntyre:** A modern virtue ethicist, MacIntyre defines ethics in practices, virtues, and narratives. He emphasizes the importance of moral traditions and communities in ethical understanding.

MORAL PHILOSOPHY

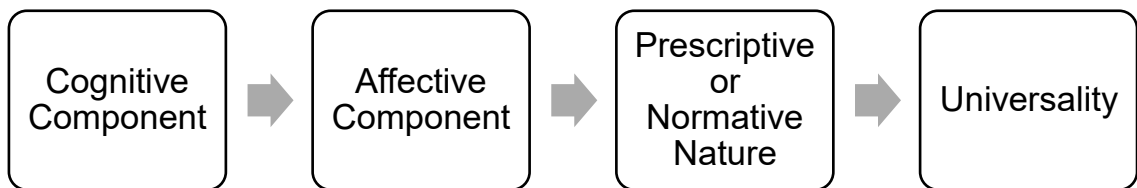
